### **Tom Boivin Wins Life Saving Award**

It was an emotional few minutes at the start of this month's Hinesburg Fire department meeting. Tom Boivin, a long-time member of the department, was given a life saving award by Hinesburg Select Board Chairman Lynn Gardener.

Present during the award ceremony was Shane Driscoll and his mother Judy Driscoll. Shane was a passenger in a car that went ran off of Texas Hill Road on June 17 and slammed broadside into a tree. While the driver escaped with minor injuries, Shane Driscoll was crumpled in the passenger seat with his head cocked at an awkward angle and was not breathing.

Boivin, one of the first people at the scene because the crash occurred near his home, recognized that Driscoll would die unless he took action. He crawled into the wrecked vehicle and gently positioned Driscoll's head to open an airway and then held Driscoll's head with just the right amount of tension to maintain the airway. With his airway open, Driscoll began to breathe again and by the time he reached the hospital he was talking with the emergency medical attendants.

Gardener praised Boivin for his actions that night and for his long time commitment to the town. Both Shane and Judy Driscoll thanked not only Boivin, but the entire group of firefighters, first responders and numerous police officers who were present for the ceremony. The ceremony concluded with a standing ovation for Boivin.

# Regional Public Transportation Initiative

The Hinesburg Selectboard will hear about a new initiative to expand public transportation services in northwestern Vermont at its October 4 meeting, to be held at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Micque Glitman, Project Coordinator of the Regional Public Transportation Initiative, will speak to the board about the future of public transportation in Hinesburg and Chittenden County.

Glitman will be seeking comments from board members and the public about new recommendations developed by the Initiative, a task force of the Chittenden County Metropolitan Planning Organization (CCMPO).

The Initiative's initial recommendations call for legislation that would authorize a Regional Public Transportation District to plan, implement, and manage public transportation in Chittenden County. An interim board of the new District would develop detailed governance and funding proposals and report back to the legislature for final approval before a public vote on the issue.

A key element of the Initiative's proposal is decreased reliance on the property tax as a means of funding public transportation. The Task Force recommends the creation of a dedicated fund for public transportation within the State Transportation Fund.

Transportation is crucial to seniors' ability to live well independently and a family's economic survival. Expanded public transportation services would give the Town of Hinesburg more options to meet the needs of its 355 households with only one vehicle, those with no vehicle available, and its senior citizens, approximately 225 of whom are over 65 years of age.

Regional public transportation, which could include commuter shuttles and cross-county links, would reduce traffic congestion and ease the commute of the over 1,400 Hinesburg residents who travel to work in other towns in Chittenden County and the 666 people who travel into Hinesburg daily for work.

After receiving feedback from Hinesburg and other Chittenden County communities, the Task Force will present its final proposal to the Boards of the CCMPO and the Chittenden County Transportation Authority (CCTA) for approval this fall. Final adoption of the recommendations is scheduled for October.More information and an opportunity to submit comments can be found on the CCMPO Web site at site at http://www.ccmpo.org/rpti.


The Planning Commission and I are very much looking forward to working with the community on zoning changes to help implement the new Plan. We are planning to hold

### FEMA Flood Hazard Map Revisions



### **SCHIP** is Sailing



### **Selectboard Activity** August 16 - 30

### Village Crosswalk Assessment

Resource System Group, Inc. (RSG) recently completed an assessment of existing and potential crosswalk locations in the village area. This project was funded by a grant from the Chittenden County Metropolitan Planning Organization. RSG presented the findings of the assessment at the August 30 meeting. Members of the community and the Selectboard provided RSG with comments and feedback on the report.

The assessment determined that the current location of the Route 116 crosswalk, just south of the Charlotte Road intersection, is the most suitable location for a crosswalk in this vicinity given the current intersection control and layout; however, improvements should be made to increase the safety of the crosswalk. The assessment also determined that the highest priority for sidewalk construction is to connect the sidewalk segments on the west side of Route 116, between the Town Hall and Saputo Foods.

### Approval of **Zoning Administrator Appointment**

Approximately forty residents appeared at the August 16 Selectboard meeting to provide input on the appointment of the Zoning Administrator. The Zoning Administrator is appointed by the Planning Commission for a three-year term, and the appointment must be approved by the Selectboard. At their July 21 meeting, the Planning Commission approved the reappointment of Peter Erb as Zoning Administrator.

Some residents spoke in favor of Peter's performance as Zoning Administrator, and some voiced their frustration at the permitting process and a potential conflict of interest between Peter's duties as Zoning Administrator and staff person to the Development Review Board. After hearing the commendations and concerns of the residents present, the Selectboard voted to approve the appointment of Peter Erb as Zoning Administrator for a three-year term, but also advised that the staff structure

#### "To Pave or Not To Pave"

Texas Hill Road resident Deb Howard met with the Board on August 16 to discuss planning for road improvement projects. Deb had assisted last fall in conducting a private survey of Texas Hill Road residents regarding a proposed plan to pave a steep section of Texas Hill Road. She presented the survey results to the Selectboard in December, and at that time offered to assist in forming a committee which would gather data and information to aid the Selectboard in the decision making process regarding paving gravel roads. At the August 16 meeting, the Board discussed what type of information was helpful in making these decisions, such as maintenance costs and safety issues.

#### Improvements to Ballard's Corner Road

Carpenter Carse Library Trustee Katherine Kjelleren met with the Board on August 16 to discuss plans for maintenance improvements to Ballard's Corner Road. As a private road, the property owners, including the Carpenter Carse Library, are responsible for the maintenance and improvement costs. Before investing in road improvements, the Library Board

wanted to assess what the impacts of the proposed recreation path would have on the road. The Selectboard recommended just basic repairs at this time, such as filling pot holes, and aligning major road reconstruction with the installation of the recreation path.

### **Process for Zoning District Changes**

Wayne Bissonette met with the Selectboard and members of the Planning Commission at the August 30 meeting to discuss his wish to have the zoning district changed for his parcel at the intersection of Route 116 and Shelburne Falls Road. The parcel is currently zoned for agricultural, and Wayne would like it re-zoned for commercial usage. The process for zoning changes was discussed, which begins with language in the Town Plan that allows for the zoning change. It was the consensus of the Selectboard that the proposed language for the new Town Plan allows for such a zoning change. Once the Town Plan is adopted, the Planning Commission will begin the process of reviewing zoning changes. The Selectboard requested that the Planning Commission consider the west side of Route 116, north of the village, the Commission's highest planning priority.

There will be official notices in the paper and a public comment period, but I encourage anyone with questions to pay us a visit at the Town Office. We have the draft maps and can show you if your property is in or out of the flood hazard area. This has implications when a mortgage company decides whether or not to require you to purchase flood insurance.

### Hinesburg – The Windy "City"

It has been a great pleasure to see the new NRG Systems facility completed. I'm sure the Blittersdorfs and all their employees are happy to be in such a new, state of the art facility. It's impressive how such a large building can be absorbed by the natural landscape when carefully sited and constructed on the right location. Furthermore, I always get a kick out of seeing the solar array track the sun over the course of the day. Clearly this is a feather in the hat for the Hinesburg community!

We were recently informed that NRG Systems has applied to the Vermont Public Service Board (PSB) to install a wind turbine on the top of the hill behind their new facility. According to the application, the tower will be approximately 97' high, and the rotor diameter will be 23'. The turbine will be capable of producing a peak power output of 10 kilowatts. This is compared to the 67 kilowatts produced by the solar panels on the NRG facility roof, awning, and tracking units around the pond.


The PSB is reviewing the proposal because it needs a "certificate of public good" as an interconnected net metered power system. Interconnected net metered power systems are those that can actually supply electricity back to the grid. NRG already received this approval for its solar generation. The PSB does take comments on these applications, and the comment period ends on October 13. For more information about the PSB process, contact them at 828-2358.

It's my understanding that the PSB review process effectively "trumps" any local level review of power providers. Therefore, I don't expect the Hinesburg Development Review Board or the Zoning Administrator to carry out a separate review process. With that in mind, contact either NRG Systems or the PSB for details.

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


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

### **South Burlington Woman Cited for Bad Checks**

Hinesburg Community Police Officer Barbara Brisson has charged Kellie Y. Desrosiers, 38, of South Burlington with two counts of issuing bad checks to a local business in Hinesburg. It is alleged that Desrosiers wrote the two checks totaling over a one hundred and fifty dollars during the month of April. She will answer the charges at a later date in Criminal Court.

### Assistance Nets DUI

Hinesburg Community police had a DUI arrest as a result of assisting Williston Police. On August 8, about 7:00 p.m., Officer Steve Gutierrez was assisting Williston Police with a domestic assault.

As he finished that complaint, he was asked to check an accident on Oak Hill Road. During the course of his investigation, he determined that the driver of the car that had run off the road, Michael Nathan, 21, of Essex, was intoxicated.

Nathan was transported to Fletcher Allen hospital by St. Michael's ambulance and treated. When released he was processed for DUI and cited for a later appearance in court.

### **Hinesburg Man Charged Following Pursuit**

Travis Miner, 18, of Hinesburg was charged with attempting to elude a police officer and negligent operation, both criminal violations, following a short pursuit on August 17. Officer Steve Gutierrez observed Miner crossing into his lane as he approached Gutierrez's cruiser on North Road.

As Gutierrez made a U turn, Miner turned onto Beecher Hill Road with tires smoking and sped off. At the lower end of Beecher Hill he narrowly missed striking another motorist, lost control and skidded around striking an embankment. He then continued on and stopped before Vermont Route 116.

Once Miner stopped Gutierrez recognized him from a previous incident on October 31, 2004 where he had stopped him for driving 81 miles per hour on Baldwin Road, also a gravel road.

### Three Injured in Tractor Trailer Crash

On August 20 three people were injured in an accident when a tractor trailer struck one car and pushed it into a second





on Route 116 near Place Road West, Officer Barbara Brisson reported that Holly Cota, 27, of Hinesburg, was waiting to make a left turn on Route 116. A tractor trailer driven by Raymond Cook, 64, of Bristol, was unable to stop and it struck the rear of a car driven by Mary McEwen, 44, of Williston. The impact pushed McEwen's car into the rear of Cota's car.

Cota and two passengers, Allana Berard and Dana Cota, none of whom was wearing a seatbelt, suffered minor injury. Holly and Dana Cota were transported to the hospital by Shelburne Rescue. All of the injured were treated at the scene by Hinesburg Fire Department.

### **Hinesburg Man Charged** With Stealing Girl's Bike

On September 5, Hinesburg Community Police Officer Steve Gutierrez charged Steven Neale, 17, of Mountain View Trailer Park, Hinesburg, with Petit Larceny. It is alleged that Neale stole a bike from a residence on North Road on August 12. Neale will answer the charge in Criminal Court.

### Of Kids and Cops

The relationship between teenagers and cops can sometimes be rocky, particularly when dealing with emotional issues. To a teenager there is nothing more emotional than the right to drive to school and where to park his or her car.

Conversely Hinesburg Police were not pleased when residents in the CVU High School area called and asked for officers, instead of parents, to respond to the school and spend the night monitoring students who were gathering to be first in line the following morning, August 31, for parking permits.

Chief Chris Morrell met first with students at CVU, a second time at CVU, then still later in the night when they relocated to Firehouse Plaza. Working with the students there, it was agreed that the place where they would have the least impact on neighbors was Geprage Park. During a final meeting in the park, Morrell asked the students to be mindful of their noise and to pick up any trash they brought to the park.

Morrell praised the students for their responsible and cooperative attitude, their care in not disturbing neighbors, and their making sure that there was no debris left in the park when they left. He described dealing with the students as positive. They displayed courtesy, understanding and an excellent civic attitude. While not subjects evaluated on scholastic aptitude tests, Morrell gave them all an A+.

### **Hinesburg Police** Complete Harvest

September 14 saw Hinesburg Community Police taking a break from patrolling the highways and answering calls in Hinesburg. Based on a tip, officers headed into the jungle-like terrain along Lewis Creek between Baldwin Road and Silver Street. After a search, they located approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000 worth of marijuana plants. Following several hours of bushwhacking and wading the creek, the marijuana was harvested and destroyed.

Police advise residents in the Lewis Creek area to be alert for suspicious activity along the creek and at the entry and exit points.

### **Hinesburg Officer to Take Command Position**

Hinesburg Community Police Officer Susan Albert has been hired by the town of Brandon to take the Lieutenant's position in their police department. Albert will assist in the rebuilding of the department that is presently taking place.

Albert has worked for the Hinesburg Community Police as a part time patrol officer. She has previous experience with the Vermont State Police as Trooper and Shelburne

The bids will be opened at the Select Board meeting on Monday, October 4.


### Safety Tip – **Stomp and Steer**

It seems strange, many of us have switched from cars without ABS brakes to cars with them, yet we have never received any instruction on how to make them work effectively

Many people still use the old techniques of pumping the brakes or threshold braking and never benefit from the ABS.

With ABS if you apply the brakes lightly and one wheel is on a slippery surface, you will feel the ABS kick in on that wheel. Unfortunately, because you are only applying light pedal pressure, you are not providing good braking with the wheels that are on a dry surface.

To achieve full braking potential, stomp hard on the brakes and steer around any obstruction. Not only do ABS brakes provide superior stopping power in most situations, they also allow you to control your car and steer through emergency situations after you begin braking hard.

We had tons of fun! Happy reading to all; I look forward to the Summer Reading Program 2005.




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### Hinesburg Nursery School — New Kids, Same Great Mission

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

### **Red Cross Blood Donations**

Summer may be over but the effects from this year's unprecedented summer blood shortage remain. While blood supplies are starting to recover, blood products have a limited shelf life and cannot be stockpiled. Red blood cells last 42 days and platelets, which often help support the treatment of cancer patients, can only be transfused for five days after donation. Blood donors are needed every day to keep hospital inventories at safe levels while maintaining enough to cover a major emergency.

The Northern Vermont Chapter of the American Red Cross (ARC) welcomes blood donations at the collection center located at 32 North Prospect Street in Burlington. To be eligible to give blood, potential donors must be at least 17 years of age, weigh over 110 pounds, and be in good health. Most medications are acceptable and there is no longer an upper age limit.

Donors' hours are Monday and Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.; Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.; and the first and second Saturday of every month from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon. 
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


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### **Literary Journal Seeks Vermont Writers**

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

### **National Shortage of TVM and O&M Instructors Inspires Tuition-Free Master's Program**

Ever thought about getting your Master's degree, but don't know where to go or don't have the money? The Vermont Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired (VABVI) is pleased to announce that the University of Massachusetts at Boston is looking for students to enroll in their on-line Master's Degree training programs for Teachers of the Visually Impaired (TVI) or Orientation & Mobility (O&M) Instructors. This special program is tuition-free, but there is a commitment to work in Vermont for a certain amount of years upon graduation.

The Graduate College of Education at the University of Massachusetts has received two five-year federal grants to address a national and regional shortage of teachers and related service professionals with specialized knowledge in Visual Impairments.

Teachers of the Visually Impaired (TVI's) are educational specialists providing support to both the student and classroom teacher. The primary goal of the TVI in a public school setting is to support the full inclusion of the child within the classroom in all educational experiences. This is accomplished by assessment, direct instructional support, curriculum adaptation and consultation to the educational team including family and community.

Orientation and Mobility (O&M) specialists teach people who are blind or visually impaired the skills and concepts they need in order to travel independently and safely, be it in the home and classroom, or in the community and city. Some O&M Instructors teach visually impaired children in school programs, others teach adults in rehabilitation settings.

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
