Election Day is November 4

Election Day will be here before we know it! The last day to register to vote if you are not already on the voter checklist in Hinesburg is Wednesday, Oct. 29 at 5:00 p.m. You can vote prior to Election Day at the clerk's office during normal business hours or request that a ballot be mailed to you. You can request the ballot by mail, phone, or e-mail. You should anticipate traffic back-ups during both the morning and evening commutes on Tuesday, November 4, which is the official Election Day. Seek an alternative route if you can, especially if you have already voted.

If you have a family member who is living in another country, or is serving in the military on active duty either here or abroad, they can request an absentee ballot be e-mailed to them in order to expedite the process of getting the ballots to them. This is NOT an option for civilians living in the United States. They can e-mail us their request for a ballot at mross@hinesburg.org.

Candidates may place signs outside the polling place on the night prior to the election as long as they don't impede pedestrian access. We do request that all candidate signs be removed on the day following the election whenever

possible. Please do not enter the polling place with any visible literature, buttons or other candidate paraphernalia. When checking in at the polls to vote on Election Day, please state your name clearly to the poll workers at the check-in table. Identification is not needed at the polls in Vermont. Election results for Hinesburg will be posted on the Town of Hinesburg website following the close of the polls. Please remember to exercise your right to vote and make your voice heard by casting your ballot in the upcoming election!

Hinesburg to Vote on Water System Expansion

Hinesburgers will decide whether the town will borrow \$1,500,000 to expand its municipal water supply on Election Day, November 4. The bond issue would finance the acquisition of two new wells and the construction of a treatment facility to reduce the levels of naturally occurring calcium carbonate, iron and manganese in the water.

The cost of servicing this bond would be borne by the users of the municipal water system through increased rates and possibly "allocation fees" leveled on new developments and commercial users. According to town officials, the town's tax rate would not be affected. The Town estimates the additional cost to residential municipal water users at roughly \$125 a year.

There is one more public hearing on the issue, scheduled for 7:00 p.m. Monday, November 3—the day before the election—in the Main Hall of the Hinesburg Town Hall.

Proponents of the bond issue point out that the town's current system is inadequate even for the present level of demand. The state has issued a Notice of Alleged Violation to the town, as current demand is about 190 gallons per minute, and the system is currently only able to produce 120 gallons per minute. The wells produce less water than they did when they were put into service in the 1970s and 1990s. This means that they pump more hours a day than they were permitted for.

The new water treatment capabilities should alleviate the hard-water problems that current users experience, although the process adds sodium to the water, which is a concern to those who must restrict their sodium intake.

The old wells also have small amounts of MBTE contamination from old leaked gasoline, below the levels the state considers dangerous, but still a concern to some. The new wells, which have already been drilled and tested, are located on the Wainer property, off Shelburne Falls Road, and according to literature produced by town officials,

are not contaminated with MBTE, and are unlikely to be contaminated in the future because they are outside of the town's development corridor.

The Hannaford project was denied a land use permit only because of the town's inadequate water supply. Other new development, such as the Haystack Crossing project, also depends on more water from the town. It's clear that significant additional industrial or residential development in the town's central village area cannot happen until the water system capacity is improved.

Opponents cite what they believe is the unfairness of a townwide vote on a financial obligation that will fall only on those connected to the system. In addition, some opponents of Hannaford and/or Haystack Crossing see a negative bond issue vote as a way of delaying or stopping the additional development.

Property Taxes Due November 17

Property taxes are due on November 17 since November 15 falls on a Saturday. We do not currently accept credit cards for property tax payments. Some towns have opted to do so, but the taxpayer is assessed a three percent surcharge to cover the fees associated with such transactions. Many towns that provide for payment by credit card have very few people who avail themselves of this opportunity because of this extra assessment, which can add up to a lot of extra money. Young Trail Users Interviewed

The Trails Committee often wonders how much use our trails receive. Occasionally we do surveys at the Town Meeting. But most of our research is anecdotal. A completely unused trail would give itself away. Likewise a highly used one will show wear. Being aware of other hikers as we hike gives us a hunch.

Recently we installed trailhead kiosks in the Old Town Forest, Russell Trails and LaPlatte Headwaters Town Forest. These kiosks include a container of

trail maps. We have been glad to notice that these containers are being emptied and need to be refilled often. Others are enjoying our trails as do we on the Committee.

However, human interest stories are the most heartwarming.

Three weeks ago the Goldsmith family joined two other families (eight children, six parents and a dog) for a hike in the Old Town Forest. They selected the International and Maiden trails, easily reached from the West Hayden Hill Road entrance. Those two trails were completely upgraded a year ago by the Fellowship of the Wheel mountain bike club. I chatted with the three Goldsmith children about their experience.

“What surprised you the most?” I asked.

Linnie (age 8) responded: “There were 50 bridges. Not bridges like the Winoski River has. More like board walks. But still bridges. We saw some birds; maybe Osprey or even Eagles.” Linnie’s brother Greg did not agree that they saw Osprey and Eagle.

“Did anything else surprise you?” The three youngsters began exchanging grins and chuckles.

“What are you laughing about?” I asked.

“We all took big spills. Because we were running and having fun, we would fall. Most of the time these falls were like stubbed toes but each one of us had one really big spill and had to let our parents clean up the blood from the many scratches. They were horrified by all the cuts. We didn’t care. Want to see our scars?”

One by one sleeves rolled up, shirts pulled up, and pant cuffs were raised. They were 98% healed but I could get a feel for what happened.

I am not sure what lesson was learned but I am sure that they had a great time.

Next time a longer tougher trail and fewer crack ups?

Winter Composting Hints

As the red line in the thermometer heads south, many people wonder whether they should continue composting food scraps in the winter. “Doesn’t everything just stop?” they wonder.

Nope! While backyard compost piles slow down in the cold months, the process does keep right on happening all year ‘round. And if you bring your scraps to CSWD Drop-Off Centers or Green Mountain Compost for composting instead of throwing them in the trash, we make sure the process keeps going every day of the year. You can get a free kitchen countertop compost collection pail by visiting a Drop-Off Center or Green Mountain Compost.

To get you going with composting in your own backyard, check out our free build-your-own compost bin plans at tinyurl.com/HRbinplans or get a great deal on a SoilSaver backyard compost bin at Green Mountain Compost - only \$49 (available for Chittenden County residents only).

A happy compost pile contains these elements:

Wet/green material, such as food scraps. These items add nitrogen.

Dry/brown material, such as leaves, straw, paper towels, greasy take-out pizza boxes, or sawdust. These items add carbon.

Microbes, who do all the work to transform compostables into compost! Just

like you, they need certain foods to survive. Their version of meat and potatoes? Nitrogen and carbon. If your bin has an open bottom, microbes migrate up from the soil and start dining out on all the goodies you toss them. If you have a barrier on the bottom, or if your soil is not that rich, then you can add microbes by adding some microbe-rich compost, or shoveling some nearby, better-quality soil into the bin at the beginning of the process.

Air and moisture, which we all need! Some people vigorously turn and stir their compost piles regularly. Others simply stick a pitchfork in the pile and wiggle it around in a few places to open up new channels for air and moisture to enter the pile. The more regularly you keep the air and moisture flowing to all parts of the pile, the more quickly it’ll turn into black gold. Compost should be kept moist, not drippy – more like a wrung-out sponge.

Here’s a tip for making sure you have enough dry/brown material all year round: During leaf-raking season, fill a couple of garbage cans with dry leaves, wood shavings, or small chips, then close the lid tight and keep them by your compost bin. That way, throughout the winter, as you’re composting, you’ll have a ready supply of carbon on hand to cover your latest contribution to your compost pile.

Because you’ve read this far, here’s a bonus tip: To make sure your pile has a good amount of helpful microbes, save a bucket of finished compost or soil from your yard. Each time you add your food scraps, toss in a handful or two of microbe-rich soil or compost and then cover it with the leaves or sawdust you’ve saved. And don’t worry if your food scraps look like a frozen mass during the coldest part of winter. Down

in the center of the pile, there’s usually still enough activity to keep things going, ready to burst forth again during the occasional thaw or come spring.

CSWD to Explore Alternatives to Consolidated Collection

The Chittenden Solid Waste District has been studying more efficient and cost-effective ways to collect residential trash in Chittenden County. The District has been looking at a system known as consolidated collection. Many residents and haulers expressed concern over residents losing their ability to choose their hauler and the proposed system’s potential negative impact on small haulers, leading CSWD’s Board of Commissioners to call a time-out at its monthly meeting on September 24, directing staff to consider additional options.

Public and municipal official informational meetings on consolidated collection, scheduled on October 30 and November 3, have been cancelled.

Consolidated collection is a system in

which a municipality (CSWD or an individual city, village, or town) contracts with one or more haulers to provide curbside collection service for specific routes or districts within that municipality, rather than have multiple haulers serving a scattering of customers in each neighborhood.

The main concerns motivating CSWD’s effort to rework the curbside trash and recycling collection system include:

- Under the current system, it could be very expensive to implement Act 148 requirement for haulers to provide food scrap and yard debris (also called “organics”) collection for those subscribing to curbside service.
- Excessive road wear, costs, fuel use, noise and pollution resulting from the current system of many trucks serving the same neighborhoods.

CSWD has the statutory authority and responsibility for the management of solid waste in Chittenden County. Its mission is to provide efficient, economical, and environmentally sound management of solid waste generated by member towns and cities and their residents and businesses. Pollution, impact on public infrastructure, and affordability of organics collection triggered CSWD’s review of options to address concerns impacting that mandate.

The Board felt it unwise to undergo plans to implement a system-wide change in the way curbside pickup is managed at the same time that CSWD is trying to meet the mandates of Act 148 (particularly unit-based rates and residential organics collection), and while the District is going through the process of replacing the General Manager.

“Many of our residents support moving to a consolidated collection system, and many oppose it,” noted CSWD’s Board Chairman, Paul Stabler. “We re-

ceived a lot of feedback from all sides and we must take the values and opinions of all of our members into consideration before making any decision. At the same time, it is important to continue working towards a solution to prepare the District to meet the mandates of Act 148 as they come on line.”

The Board instructed the staff to undertake the following:

1. A pause in the process of considering consolidated collection as a means of achieving the stated goals.
2. Consider additional options for achieving our stated goals of reducing collection cost, reducing the impact on infrastructure and the environment, and effectively collecting segregated organic waste by July 2017. Continue working with the hauling community to achieve these objectives. Identify needs for supplemental data.
3. Return to the Board with a progress report and potential recommendations by the June 2015 Board meeting.

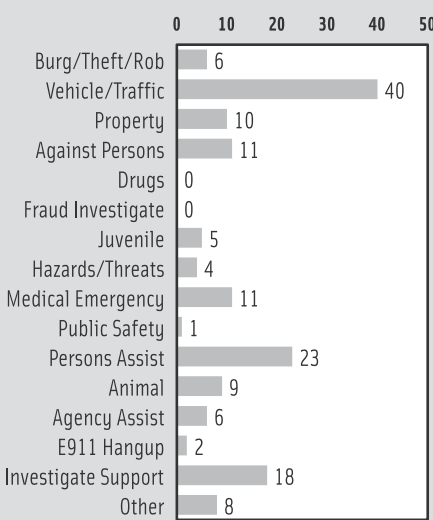
The Hinesburg Community Police would like to welcome Jeremy Halshof to our department. Jeremy comes to us from Burlington PD and is a full time certified officer.

Criminal Driving While License Suspended

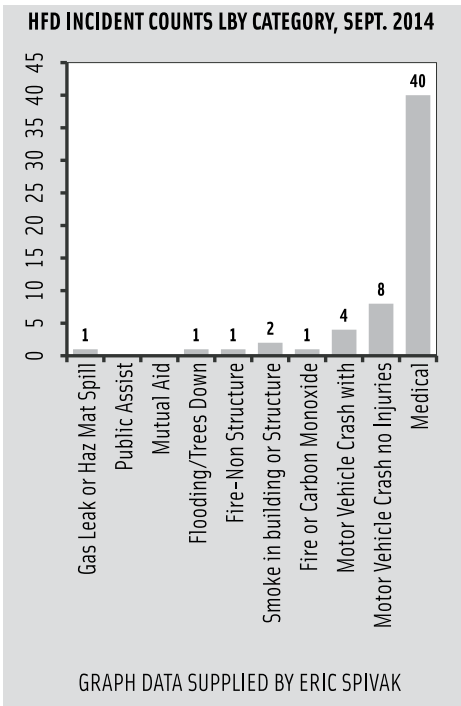

Have a Fireplace or Wood Stove?

Before burning this season, be sure to have fireplaces, stoves, flue pipes and chimneys checked and cleaned by a chimney sweep. Soot and creosote can build up in the pipes and chimney, causing them to be blocked and may result in a fire. REMEMBER – should you have a fire in your wood stove flue, call 911, close the vents and flue, and leave the building.

...And Don't Forget About Your Furnace

Whether you use natural gas, oil, kerosene or propane, furnaces and burners need to be cleaned periodically to keep them running cleanly and efficiently. While cleaning, the company should also check for any leaks which could result in CO getting into your home.

Be Safety Smart this Winter

No matter what you use for heating, be sure to keep the area around the stove and furnace clear. As snow and ice start to accumulate and build up, be sure to keep the vents, including dryer vents, clear. When the vents are blocked, air has nowhere to go but back into your home, resulting in a buildup of Carbon Monoxide (CO).

If your garage is a part of the house, or if you have rooms over your garage, do not warm your car up inside. The exhaust has nowhere to go but through-out your home.

If a CO or smoke detector sounds, do NOT open windows or wait. Call 911 and leave the building. When we arrive, we have monitors which can detect levels of CO gases. CO is an odorless and colorless gas. Prolonged exposure can result in headaches, sickness or worse.

Frost Beer Works Brewery to Open in Hinesburg

A microbrewery is coming to Hinesburg. Frost Beer Works, owned by Garin Frost, has taken over a portion of the 171 Commerce Street building (with Minuteman Press occupying the remainder). Frost formerly owned Vermont Print and Mail, which resided in this same building. Although Frost lives in Williston with his wife, son, and daughter, he believes Hinesburg makes perfect sense for the location of his brewery, saying, "I have a great fondness for Hinesburg and see it as a really great location for a brewery." He has been working hard on getting the location ready for the delivery of the brewing equipment, which is scheduled for late October or early November.

Frost first became fascinated with the process of brewing beer in the 1990s

when he had a friend who was a home brewer. He then realized that at some point in his life, he wanted to build and run a brewery. About four years ago, he invested in a small commercial-quality brewing system with which he brews beer in his basement. He can not sell the beer he brews there, as there is no way to obtain approval to brew in his basement for anything other than personal consumption (and with friends, of course). He and his friends have nicknamed this group as his "official tasters," for whom he owes a great deal of gratitude. In the Hinesburg location, he will continue to brew on that half-barrel (15.5 gallon) pilot system as well as his new seven-barrel (217 gallon) system.

Vermont has more breweries per capita than any other state, but Frost believes his beer can stand up to the competition. "Vermont has a lot of award winning breweries and a lot of exceptional beers," he said. "This is the perfect place to build a brewing business if your products can stand up to the demands and expectations of your consumers. I believe we will have some really great beer, which I hope will be well received. We have really focused on a very few styles such as IPAs (India Pale Ales), and Pale Ales. Initially we intend to continue to focus on brewing both Northeast and Southwest style IPAs and Pale Ales."

Although Frost has aspirations for more, the brewery will have only a very limited capacity for the foreseeable fu-

ture. Since Frost has a full-time job, he expects that the brewery will only be brewing and open for sampling on the weekends. He hopes to be fully moved in and operational by the beginning of 2015, if not sooner. State Senators Discuss Health Care Reform with Hinesburg Business People

On September 16, Chittenden State Senators Tim Ashe and Diane Snelling joined members of the Hinesburg Business and Professional Association for a wide-ranging discussion of Vermont's health care system, and how reform efforts may impact Hinesburg small businesses.

"It's important to hear directly from local businesses about their concerns on how health care reform will affect them," said Snelling. "The proposed changes are monumental for business and for Vermont. We need to make certain that it will be affordable for everyone, and that all voices are heard."

Several businesses, including a local law firm, cleaning company, contractor and others, expressed concern about their experiences with the Vermont Health Connect website and the uncertainties of Vermont's current health care reform planning.

"I believe we have the opportunity to provide insurance to all Vermonters and to reform the way we pay for services, but we have to be very careful," Ashe said. "Any changes to the current system need to be carefully designed."

"Tim and I come from different perspectives on health care reform, but we agree that small business owners can provide some of the best information on the financial impact of any changes," Snelling added, noting that the two legislators plan to conduct similar discussions in other towns.

Ashe described the non-partisan meeting as, "very insightful", leaving both legislators with an appreciation of the potential consequences, good and bad, of various changes being considered in Montpelier.

Vermont Smoke and Cure Goes Solar

Vermont Smoke and Cure of Hinesburg is teaming with AllEarth Renewables of Williston to source local renewable solar energy to supply the company's electrical needs. Nearly half of Vermont Smoke and Cure's electric demand is now being supplied by solar projects, with future plans for solar to fulfill all of the meat plant's electrical load.

A 156-kilowatt solar orchard in Essex and an 88-kilowatt solar orchard in Marshfield will produce approximately 366,000-kilowatt hours annually for the Hinesburg company. Both projects utilize Vermont-made solar trackers.

Several other Vermont businesses have recently teamed up with AllEarth Renewables to go solar and save money on their electric bills, including Woodchuck Hard Cider, Concept2, Small Dog Electronics, Jericho Settlers Farm, Stark Mountain Woodworking, American Flatbread, Green Mountain Power, Cold Hollow Cider and Morse Farm Sugarworks, among others.

AllEarth Renewables is the Vermont manufacturer of the AllSun Tracker, a dual-axis solar tracker that uses GPS and wireless technology to follow the sun throughout the day, producing up to 45 percent more energy than fixed rooftop solar panels. The company has manufactured and installed more than 2,400 solar tracker systems used for residential and commercial installations.

The Administration of Governor Shumlin is expected to present the Legislature with a health care financing plan in January. Senator Ashe, a Burlington resident, chairs the Senate Finance Committee, which has responsibility for raising any state revenues, and Senator Snelling, of Hinesburg, is a key figure on the Senate Appropriations Committee, which annually drafts the state budget. Those two committees will be at the center of any health care reform legislation.

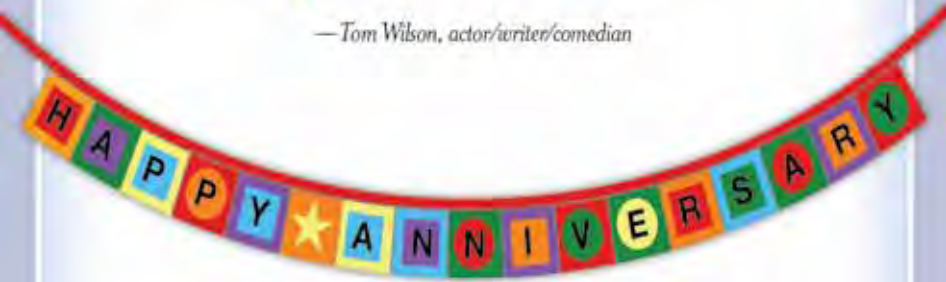

VNA Public Flu Clinic on October 31

The Visiting Nurse Association of Chittenden and Grand Isle Counties (VNA) has announced its 2014 series of seasonal flu vaccination clinics. VNA flu clinics are offered for adults ages 18 and older and will be held at convenient locations in Chittenden and Grand Isle counties. VNA flu shots are administered by a licensed nurse. This year, the VNA will administer the quadrivalent flu vaccine, which protects against four different strains of the flu; two influenza A viruses and two influenza B viruses. To learn more about the quadrivalent vaccine, visit the Centers for Disease Control website at cdc.gov/flu.

VNA Community Flu Clinics are scheduled through early November. A clinic will take place in Hinesburg at the United Church of Hinesburg on October 31 from 10:00 a.m. until noon. For complete clinic hours, locations and information, please call the VNA at 658-1900 or visit vnacares.org/flu. Individuals may also call the VNA to arrange a flu shot at our Prim Road location in Colchester.

Free with Medicare

Medicare B or Medicaid cards are required for a vaccine at no charge. Please bring and show your card at registration in order

for the fee to be waived. All others will pay a \$41 fee. Cash or checks are accepted. Credit cards are currently being accepted at public clinics.

Peg Slagle, RN, VNA Infection Control Officer explained, "It takes about two weeks after vaccination for your body to develop an immune response. Get vaccinated now so you will be protected all season long." She added that recent news reports indicate there may be an increase in cases this flu season. "Everyone should reduce the risk of becoming ill by receiving an early flu shot to protect both themselves and their family," said Peg.

A flu shot is especially important for people with high risk of having serious flu-related complications including:

- Pregnant women
- People 65 years old or older
- People of any age with certain chronic medical conditions
- Nursing home and long-term care facility residents
- People who live with or care for those at high risk for complications from flu, including:
- Health care workers
- Household contacts of persons in the high risk population
- Household contacts and outside caregivers of children younger than six months of age (children who are too young to be vaccinated).

The VNA is a 108-year-old non-profit

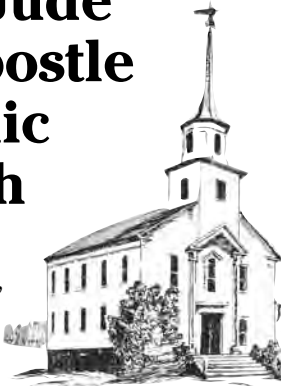
